"FAITH"

A couple weeks ago Faith hosted a group of 14 teen confirmands from area Lutheran churches who are just beginning or in the midst of preparing for confirmation. Our conversations focused on Christian identity – who we are, how we would like to be seen, how other people see us and how God sees us. Our conversations were engaging and enlightening and, I believe them to be conversations which we, as Christians, should continue to engage in, amongst ourselves, as well as others, no matter our age...age, after all, is just a number.

An individual's identity is often shaped by that person's faith traditions and the diversity of the religious landscape in which they have lived. During my pastoral clinical assignment at Hershey Medical Center, I witnessed this firsthand. I met people whose religious convictions kept them separated from the secular world in which they lived, some whose faith traditions required specific rites, and some people who denied a faith tradition who found comfort and consolation through different channels of support such as family and music.

Understanding and engaging with a diverse community... understanding and engaging with friends, family and neighbors... requires an understanding of one's own faith and an openness for learning and appreciating the differences and similarities of faith traditions. The key theological principals that inform my understanding of and engagement for other religious and non-religious traditions include:

God as Creator - God created us, our physical bodies, senses, emotions, intellect and reasoning. Everything that we have is a gift from God. God's daily blessings provide us with everything that we need to sustain our life – other human beings, animals, food, clothing, shelter, nature. God's daily blessings provide all that is required to sustain the universe – water, light, air. I believe science is an integral part of understanding creation. In understanding and engaging with others, I have come to learn that there is a universal understanding that a "power" beyond our humanity brought us into being is a common thread of perceived beliefs.

<u>Christ-Centeredness</u> - Jesus Christ, the only son of God, has two natures – divine and human. He was conceived by the Holy Spirit and born into humanity. It is through Jesus' life that we know God's love in our daily lives and it is through Jesus's life that we know of God's desire to be in relationship with us – providing us everything we need, abundantly, and forgiving us of our sins. Jesus does everything that he can so that we are in right relationship with God. It is in Jesus' death, his faith in God, and in Jesus' resurrection that we realize forgiveness and have hope for salvation. The spectrum of belief and non-belief related to Jesus is very broad, there being some who do not see Jesus as our Savior, some who see him as a prophet and some who believe he was a man, just like any other. Even though these perspectives and beliefs contrast starkly with my faith, I respect their understanding and reasoning hoping that they will respect my belief. I believe that having questions about one another's faith and understanding can provide mutual respect, understanding and open one's heart to God for a deeper understanding of one's own faith as well.

<u>Justification by Faith Alone</u> - We are justified by faith alone; there is nothing we can do to merit salvation. The forgiveness of sins is gifted to us when we have faith and believe that they are forgiven because of Christ's obedience to God. The role of good works, as viewed through the Lutheran lens, is not a means for attaining favor and forgiveness from God. The role of good works manifests itself as an expression of Christian love, love for God and love for neighbor, in response to God's abounding gift of grace. I understand that some religious traditions hold good works as a means of forgiveness. I respect this understanding in that I believe good works are important, even vital, in addressing the needs of our global community while also forming and maintaining relationships. Caring for one another and the world benefits everyone.

What are the key theological principals that inform <u>your</u> understanding of and engagement for other religious and non-religious traditions?

If you have never taken the opportunity to visit the ELCA churchwide website (https://www.elca.org), I invite you to do so as it is an invaluable source of information not only for those who want to know what ELCA Lutherans believe, but also as an affirmation of faith for us. It is from here, I share with you "Faith":

"Faith convictions expressed as statements of belief flow from this confident trust in God. We share in the faith expressed in the Apostles', Nicene and Athanasian Creeds, in the Lutheran confessional writings, and in the ELCA Confession of Faith.

At the same time faith does not close our minds to the world and our hearts to others. We continue to listen to the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. We listen to the witness of others and we watch for the ways God is active in the world around us. Faith opens a place for engaging others in conversation, for seeking the truth, for asking questions and speaking love in word and deed.

Faith is a full life, liberated for a living, daring confidence in God's grace."

As we step forward into this new year, let us do so with renewed confidence and, as Paul notes in his letter to the Corinthians (2 Corinthians 5:7), "walk by faith", serving Christ and community with the abounding love and grace gifted to us by God, exemplified by Christ, our Savior and Lord.

Our Offering Envelopes at a Glance

We thought it might be helpful to explain the lines on our offering envelopes and share with you some information that may have been forgotten or you are not familiar with.

The first line is labeled **Current**. When your offering is listed on this line, your money is spent on bill payments, payroll, purchase of supplies and other expenses.

The second line is labeled **Benevolence.** This money is sent to the Allegheny Synod and is disbursed according to their guidelines.

The third line is labeled **Building/Maintenance**. This money is deposited and used for any repairs, supplies and any maintenance needed to our buildings.

The fourth line is labeled **Missionary Fund.** This money is specifically designated and is sent to the missionaries we have a covenant with. Currently it is Viking Deitrich.

The fifth line is labeled **Other**. This is where you can indicate any "cause" you wish to support with your offering ... World Hunger, 2nd offering, Pastor's Discretionary Fund, children & youth ministry, Mission Team, any organization in the community (Food Pantries, Salvation Army, Habitat for Humanity, etc.)
